

### SERVING OUR COMMUNITIES

#### **Kinship Mediation Program**

The Center received a new contract from Monroe County Department of Human Services to provide mediation for kinship caregivers-those who are caring for grandchildren, nieces/nephews, or other relatives. The Center provided a 6-hour training on Kinship Mediation for staff and volunteers interested in serving this population.





#### Conflict Skills in the Workplace

Our Training and Community Engagement department developed several conflict skills trainings, designed for staff in schools, colleges/ universities, and nonprofit/business.Topics include: identifying your conflict style, active listening skills, and responding to microaggressions.

#### **Rochester Peace Collective**

The Center for Dispute Settlement serves as the fiduciary partner to Untrapped Ministries, which developed an innovative model to train and mentor a select group of young adults known as Community Vanguards. This program was inaugurated into the 2023 City of Rochester Peace Collective.



# BUILDING OUR CAPACITY

#### Interrupt Racism Cohort

The Center for Dispute Settlement participated in the 2022-2023 cohort of the Urban League's Interrupt Racism program. An internal Change Team, comprised of board and staff members, worked to develop goals and objectives to create transformational change as we become an anti-racist organization.

#### **Developing New Mediator Apprentices**

Eleven new mediator apprentices began working towards mediator certification, which requires three observations, three comediations, and one solo mediation, which is observed and rated by an experienced mediator. Apprentices had a chance to meet our staff and volunteers at our Volunteer Appreciation event at Star Cider in Canandaigua.


